Pastoral Ponderings

"For now, we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known." 1 Corinthians 13:12 NRSV

January is said to be named for the Roman god Janus. Janus was the god of beginnings and transitions, and therefore, by extension, of gates, doors, doorways, passages and endings. He is usually depicted as having two faces, since he looks to the future and to the past. In short, Janus was a two-faced god!



The common definition of someone who is "two-faced" is a person who practices deception. When we stand at the threshold of a new year, we can often feel the pull of that ambivalence. We wish people a "better year" in 2025. We look back at our own 2024 with all its heady mix of ills, pains, disappointments and happy moments of joy and project for ourselves a future of "better days." But what are we actually saying by this?

Are we saying, "out with the old," (a.k.a. good riddance!) and "in with the new" (a.k.a. Whew! Glad that's over!), or can we just possibly put a

"different" face on all of this? The figure of Janus in the present, looking to the past, and looking forward to the future can mean something a lot richer than that.

Let me explain. As a church in 2024, we literally "put a new face" on our building following the hailstorm damage. In so doing, however, we sought to maintain the same historic lines of the building and the steeple. In short we claimed our past to enrich our present, so as to move into our future with joy and confidence.

Personally, each of us has things represented by living through the year 2024 as best we humanly could that we would change if we were able: A sharp word said in anger; a phone call NOT made; a chance to help someone else that we let slip by; an egregious error in judgment that caused hurt, pain, or conflict. We are, after all, only human. Things that are past cannot be changed. Our challenge in "facing" a new year then is to learn from those things and to seek God's help in transforming them.

As Paul reminds us, in the present, we can only see through a glass dimly . . .we don't have all the answers, nor do we even know the questions! But, if we grab on to our faith and hang-on for dear life, we can often make the changes in our situations that can bring fulfillment and hope. We can

learn to make amends immediately when we realize we have "erred and stayed like lost sheep," as the old confession in the 1928 Book of Common Prayer, so poignantly states:

ALMIGHTY and most merciful Father; We have erred and strayed from thy ways like lost sheep. We have followed too much the devices and desires of our own hearts. We have offended against thy holy laws. We have left undone those things which we ought to have done; And we have done those things which we ought not to have done; And there is no health in us. But thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us, miserable offenders. Spare thou those, O God, who confess their faults. Restore thou those who are penitent; According to thy promises declared unto mankind In Christ Jesus our Lord. And grant, O most merciful Father, for his sake; That we may hereafter live a godly, righteous, and sober life, To the glory of thy holy Name. Amen.

This is my prayer for all in 2025. Amen and Happy New Year!
